NAPLAN ACHIEVEMENT

As you are already aware, the NAPLAN reports for Years 3, 5 and 7 have arrived. On looking at both the school and the individual achievement for the key areas of Reading and Numeracy the results are very pleasing. I am very pleased to say that we have shown sustained growth over 3 or 4 years (depending on the year level) in all 3 NAPLAN year levels. Our Education Director Christine Hatzi rang me late last week to congratulate school our on the improvements we have made. A really great story acknowledging the work of our

staff!!! The work of teachers and SSO's that has led to this improvement was acknowledged by and shared with senior DECD leaders at the Partnership Review yesterday.

MARKET DAY

On Friday the 15th of September, House 9 and House 4 held Market Day. Market Day was very successful, due to all the participating stalls and all of their wonderful products and activities.

The weather was better than expected but it was very windy. In the morning everyone was very rushed to get organised. There were between 30 and 35 stalls for students to see and participate in. We had been working hard to prepare for market day, making posters and handing out flyers at lunch. We were excited waiting for the classes to arrive and to start our own mini businesses. The atmosphere was electric. The day was divided into two sessions. When the first session started lots of people came to all the activities. The people who were running the games had to constantly approach kids and advertise to them. We were busy all the time. We were always advertising or attending to children who were playing the game. Everyone encouraged others and worked as a team. All the groups tried their best to make it successful for kids to enjoy their day. Some of us did an excellent job of spruiking. 
BUDDY HARD THINKING DAY

JOEY'S JOURNAL

This term has seen the introduction of our social and emotional learning

The Golden Rule

program, Play is the Way, across the whole school. Classes have been starting to learn and play a variety of games. These games focus on 5 different concepts, referred to in the program as life rafts.

All classes have now been introduced to key concept 1: 'Treat others as you would like them to treat you'. This is sometimes referred to as the golden rule.

Play is the Way founder Wilson McCaskill refers to society's common habit to 'Treat others as they treat you' as the broken rule. While there is only a small difference in the language of these 2 rules, there is a world of difference in actioning the rules. Students are learning to contrast the golden rule with the broken rule and how living each of these rules makes them, and those around them, feel.

I encourage you to ask your child to explain the golden rule to you and share with you why it is so important.

It is not easy for us to follow the golden rule, we instinctively return to the broken rule when we get hurt, so we cannot be surprised when children are challenged by it. However, like other challenges it is one that gets easier with practice.

The skills that are being learnt through the Play is the Way program are going to grow best if they are reinforced at home, so I encourage you to continue talking with your child about the games they have played and the challenges they may have faced.
